7 e built the Visually Impaired Person Trail and recorded signs inside the Exhibit Hall in hopes that people who were blind or had limited vision would be able to better access what we provide. But I can count on two hands the number of people who've checked out our Pen Friend audio devices. It's a lot of work to maintain the signs and recordings and sometimes I don't see the value.



Almost two years ago, students from the Colorado School for the Deaf & Blind test the Pen Friend.

Until...

A boy arrives at the Exhibit Room with his mom and homeschooling group. He stands to one side alone as if he's trying to figure out how to begin. Then, I realize he's blind and can't access our exhibits well. I approach his mom with our Pen Friend, and after a quick introduction, my new friend grabs it. His head cocks to one side as he listens intently to each reading, touches the artifacts, and discusses with me and his mom what he already knows and what he's learning. After a half hour or more, his mom says it's time to go. He thanks me and I thank him for the fun time.

And suddenly, all the work is worth it.



and wildlife here. My brother even likes it, and he really likes playing





Bear Creek Sightings by Kylee Taylor, Interpretive Program Specialist, Bear Creek Nature Center

7 andering through the Gambel Oak groves here at Bear Creek, I noticed something that piqued my curiosity. The oak trees still had leaves on them! They were brown, crinkled, and not at all what I envisioned for deciduous trees in winter. So, as a naturalist does, I began to wonder why there were still leaves on the oaks and if they served any purpose. Turns out, they do! Gambel Oaks are members of a special



There's a special, scientific reason why we can enjoy Gambel Oak leaves all winter...

group of deciduous trees, also called everciduous. Other trees in the everciduous category include beech, hornbeam, and witch-hazel. These trees don't complete the process of cutting all nutrients off from the leaf stem until spring, when new buds grow. Most deciduous trees finish this process, called *abscission*, in the fall and then lose their leaves. The Gambel oaks keep their withering or *marcesent* leaves all winter, for several reasons. Trees and shrubs that grow in poor, dry soil like those at Bear Creek use this adaptation to shade the ground to help snow melt and rain evaporate more slowly, deter deer and other

herbivores from nibbling on new leaf buds, and, when they do let their leaves grow, to create mulch to further aid in holding in water around the shrubs. Don't you just love nature?
