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LETTER TO RESIDENTS

As we work to make progress in these core areas in the year to come—along with other key priorities such as enhancing data resources, aggressively pursuing additional funding opportunities, and advancing workforce development—the guiding tenets of our Strategic Plan, along with other core agency plans, will provide a strong foundation from which to build. BOARD OF HEALTH

EPCPH is governed by a nine-member Board of Health, which establishes policy, approves the agency's budget and appoints the Public Health Director. Each member serves in a voluntary capacity for a maximum of two consecutive five-year terms upon appointment by the El Paso County Board of County Commissioners.

The Board is made up of two current county commissioners, one Colorado Springs City Council member, one elected official from another municipality within El Paso County, an active or retired physician, an active or retired medical professional, a business or financial professional, a nonprofit/private organization or public education professional and a citizen-at-large member. The board meets regularly once each month and additionally as needed.

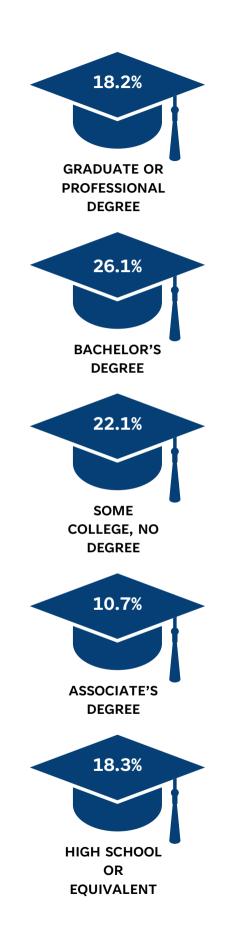

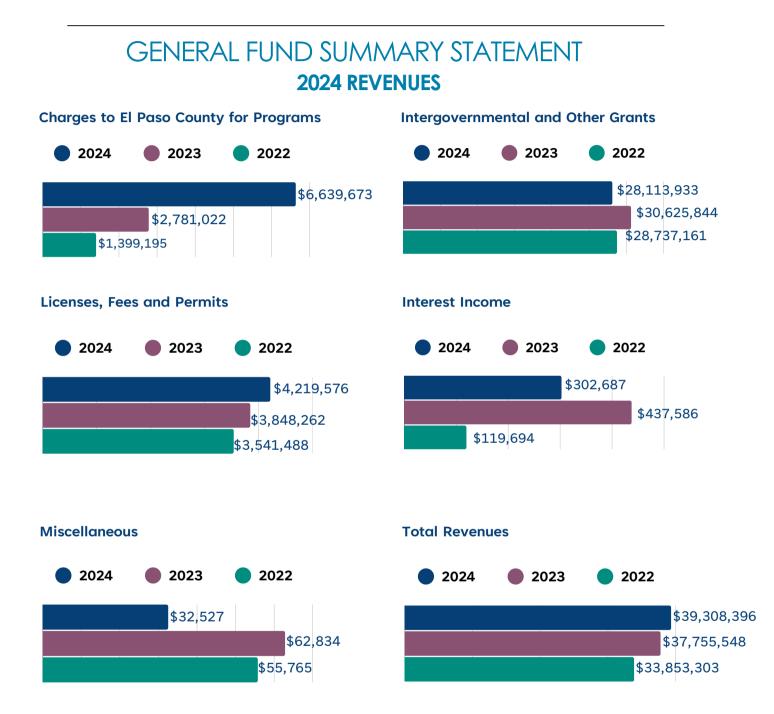

GENERAL FUND SUMMARY

The General Fund is the only operating fund of EPCPH. The three-year history of revenues and expenditures shows that overall totals have increased from 2022-2024. Between 2022 and 2024, revenues increased by 15.9 percent or \$5.4 million, and expenditures increased by 20.7 percent or \$6.9 million.

As funding continued to shift in 2024 with the end pandemic-era grants such as ARPA, these limitations necessitated the use of general funds and fund balance to support personnel costs and resources not covered by this funding. To successfully adapt to these changes, EPCPH focused on strategically aligning remaining grant funds to ensure sustained support while minimizing disruptions to programming. In 2025, EPCPH will remain focused on evaluating and increasing funding streams to cover costs to meet statutory requirements and support the needs of the growing population.

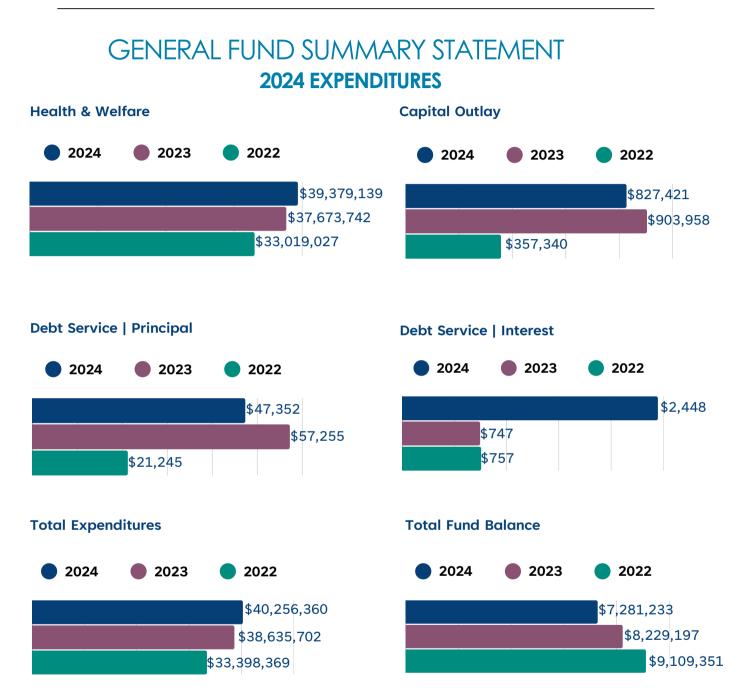
SUMMARY STATEMENT



These charts summarize the data found in the EPCPH Annual Comprehensive Financial Report, Statements of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances for the General Fund.

Revenues showed gains from 2022-2024. Licenses, fees and permits increased over this time because of improved process efficiencies and increases to certain fees approved by the Board of Health. Charges to El Paso County for programs saw an increase in 2024 as Public Health shifted from ARPA funds to General Funds. ARPA funds are captured within intergovernmental and other grants revenue. El Paso County's support for Public Health has remained consistent over this timeframe, with funding coming from different sources.

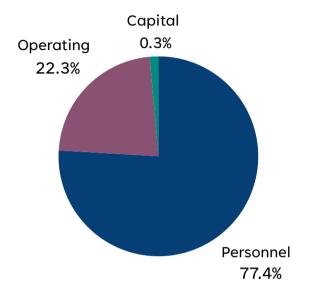


These charts are presented on non-GAAP (generally accepted accounting principles) basis. A more detailed GAAP basis financial detail can be found in the EPCPH Annual Comprehensive Financial Report in it's entirety available online at <u>www.elpasocountyhealth.org/about-public-health/</u>.

Expenditures increased from 2022 to 2024. EPCPH saw both operational and personnel increases in 2024, with expenditures exceeding revenues. EPCPH invested heavily in employees in 2024. Employee cost of living increases and pay-for-performance adjustments resulted in higher expenditures. EPCPH also invested funds to renovate the 13 Public Health South building in order to more effectively operationalize it as a functional workspace for employees and community partners.

2025 EPCPH BUDGET

2025 ORIGINAL ADOPTED BUDGET EXPENDITURES



In 2025, expenditures consist of personnel costs, which constitute 77.4 percent of the budget. This includes a 6 percent adjustment to personnel to offset the continuing rising cost of living throughout the county, state and across the nation. The remaining 22.6 percent of costs are for operating and capital expenses which help to support and maintain programs across the organization.



2025 EPCPH BUDGET

In 2025, the revenue budget totals \$27.3 million, which is a decrease of 1.5 percent from 2024. The budget decrease is associated with the additional funding provided for COVID-19 — which continues to reduce —along with other grants coming to an end. This has created a shift to the use of general funds and fund balance for other costs and resources not covered by this funding. Moving forward, EPCPH continues to pursue innovative opportunities to support both existing and new programs. The anticipated revenue of \$27.3 million continues to come from time-limited and restrictive program-specific grants, which make up 50 percent of the total revenue. The remaining revenue consists of 33 percent of supplemental funding and 17 percent fees, licenses, permits, miscellaneous, etc.





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
